



Objective/Goal: This is a warm-up activity which is a fun way for participants to interact with one another. The participants will be brainstorming activities that families like to do. Materials: Facilitator needs: Participants need: whiteboard whiteboard markers optional-picture cards **Optional: Timer** Procedure: (Warm-up) 15 minutes Before the Activity: 1) Write the sentence starter: "Families like to_____" on the whiteboard. 2) Ask the whole group (whole class) what are some activities that families like to do. 3) **Brainstorm** together. 4) **Point** to the sentence starter and **instruct** the participants to use this sentence. 5) **Have** everyone seated together in a circle-facing each other. 6) Introduction: The facilitator will **explain** activity. Begin by saying, "Families like to go on vacations" Ι. The next participant on the left, says the sentence starter: Π. Families like to <u>go on picnics together</u>. Everyone takes turns sharing their ideas. III. Next, divide the whole group (whole class) into 2 teams. Give them IV. 5 minutes to think-up of original ideas (ideas that were not shared as a whole group, before) together.

Objective/Goal: Gives an opportunity for participants to interact with each other by sharing their ideas with one another. Participants will grouped into "families". Materials: Facilitator needs: Participants need: - whiteboard - whiteboard markers - paper and pens/pencils - large paper - colouring pencils/markers - Optional: - Family Cards (Attachment #1) - Dialogue Cards(Attachment #2) Procedure: (Work-out) 60 minutes Procedure: Introduction-Before you begin: 1. Group the participants into "Families". Write on the whiteboard: Family #1= 5 people Family #2= 4 people Family #3 = 3 people Family #4 = 3 people 2. Write the following on the whiteboard: I. What is your family name (surname)? II. Who are the people in your family? Ex. Mother=? Father? Cousin? III. How old is each family member? IV. What are family activities that you like to do? (Name 5 activities) V. In your own families, what do you do? (Name 5 activities). 3. Group the participants. 4. Participants can **choose** which family they would like to be part of or the facilitator can **choose** the participants, accordingly.







- 5. Give the family card(Attachment #1) to the "families".
 6. Explain the activity. In each small group or "family" have a discussion.
- 7. **Instruct** the participants that they answer the following questions on the whiteboard.

Each "family" will discuss the following:

- I. What is your family name (surname)?
- II. Who are the people in your family? Ex. Mother=? Father? Cousin?
- III. How old is each family member?
- IV. What are family activities that you like to do?(Name 5 activities)
- V. In your own families, what do you do? (Name 5 activities).
- 8. Next: **Give** each "family" a large piece of paper and pencil crayons or markers and **create** a web.
- 9. Write the family members.

10. Write 5 activities.



11. The facilitator will **display** his/her example.

12. Afterwards, each "family" will **choose** one person to **share** their "Family Art" with the whole group (whole class). They will also **share** their responses to the whiteboard questions with the whole group. Each "family' will **post** their pictures on the whiteboard.






Objective/Goal: Gives participants an opportunity for participants to interact with one another by performing a short role-play. Facilitator needs: Materials: - whiteboard Participants need: - whiteboard markers - Family Role-play Cards (Attachment #2) Procedure: (Cool – Down) 15 minutes Before the Activity: 1. Write: "Family Role-play" on the whiteboard. 2. Ask for some volunteers. 3. **Demonstrate** using the Family Role-play Example. 4. Explain the activity to the participants. 5. The "Families" are given their role-play card according to the number of people in a family. For a class of 15- Ex. 5 Family Member Role-play 4 family Member Role-play 3 Family Member Role-play(need 2 copies) 6. Give the "Families" time to practice their role-plays. 7. Each family can **present** their role-play to the whole group (whole class). Extension Activity #1: To make the activity more challenging for higher English levels (Intermediate Level), have the participants create their own role-plays or dialogue.
