Procedure: Before the Activity: 1) Place all the name cards in the bag/hat. Activity Instructions: 2) Explain to the whole group a guessing game will be played.	
 3) First, as a whole group discuss about adjectives. 4) The facilitator can explain-"Adjectives" (words that describe a person, place, or thing) if the word is unfamiliar to the whole group. 	
5) Brainstorm some adjectives together.(Optional: words can be written on the whiteboard) Ex. short-petite tall skinny-slim fat-robust red brown etc.

- 6) The participants may **use** negative adjectives but have them **focus** on positive adjectives. For example emphasize "petite" over "short", etc.
- 7) **Instruct** the participants that you will say some sentences describing one of the participants. They must guess who you are describing.
- 8) Ex. She is tall. She has brown hair and green eyes. She is wearing gold earrings. The participant is wearing a red jacket. Guess who?
- 9) The participants **answer**, "Ex. Sandy!"
- 10) Affirm their response. Ex. "Great job, yes, I was talking about Sandy."
- 11) **Ask** for a volunteer.
- 12) **Ask** the whole group how would describe the volunteer?
- 13) The volunteer will **choose** 1 card from the hat/bag, making sure that no one sees the name.
- 14) The volunteer will **think** a minute about the participant whose name was drawn out of the bag/hat.
- 15) The volunteer will then **say** 3-5 sentences describing the person.
- 16) Ex. He has dark hair and brown eyes. He has an earring in his left ear. He is very tall. **Guess who?**
- 17) The other participants try to **guess** the appropriate person. Ex. Sergio
- 18) Everyone **takes** a turn. Then the next person **chooses** a name from the bag and does the same process.
- 19) The more detailed the description-the easier or harder to guess the person.
- 20) **Give** hints: describe hair, height, jewellery, clothes, shoes, etc.

Extension Activities:

Extension Activities are alternative or extra activities that can be done to

supplement the main activity when there is extra time. They can also be done in the next class as a review of previous vocabulary or conversation.

- **A. For higher levels of English**, try this activity once the whole group has been together for a longer period of time. The participants will know more about each other. Make the game more challenging by saying descriptions which do not involve physical attributes/characteristics but more character/personality traits or personal preferences. Ex. likes or dislikes
 - Ex. This person enjoys listening to country music. He/she loves Taylor Swift. This person likes coffee but not tea. He/she wants to become a veterinarian. He/she has 4 cats and loves animals. Guess who? Ex. *Lydia*
- **B.** You can divide the whole group into **2 smaller groups** but have 2 bags with 1 set of all the participants' name cards in each bag.
- **C.** Instead of name cards, have **animal cards** or other cards, the participants can describe animals, shapes, etc.
 - Ex. I am strong and fast. I can be brown, black, white, and speckled.
 I can run free and stay in a barn. I like to eat hay and oats. **Guess what I**am?

- D. For a more challenging activity, have the participants create descriptions using synonyms or antonyms. Challenge them to use more uncommon words. Ex. Instead of saying, "Sharon has blonde hair. Say: Sharon has honey-coloured hair." or
 - Ex. Describe the opposite of someone using antonyms: In reality: She is tall. She has brown hair and green eyes. She is wearing gold earrings. The participant is wearing a red jacket. (Ex. Sandy) but say instead the opposite:

"She is petite. She has **blonde** hair and **blue** eyes. She is wearing a **necklace**. The participant is wearing red **pants**." The boldfaced words are opposites of the original example.

*Remember to emphasize **positive characteristics** not negative ones. If they use negative ones then correct the participants.

- (Ex. Please say "petite" instead of "short or "robust" sounds better than "fat". This will help participants to increase their vocabulary.
